


# 2016 Annual Report



# **Legislation, Allocation & Drought Plan**

Water Resources Development Act (WRDA)

Drought-relief legislation critical to water supply reliability in California has passed the House of Representatives and U.S. Senate with votes of 360-61 and 78-21, respectively. As future dry years still loom just around the corner for our state, SCWC has been a strong advocate for the passage of the bill – bottom line, California must capitalize on viable water sources when available.

Of WRDA's status, **SCWC Executive Director Charley Wilson** said:

"SCWC is pleased to see the House of Representatives and U.S. Senate has passed legislation that would provide California with long overdue drought relief through increased water capture during storms. A true bi-partisan effort that will have a long reaching effect on the residents, businesses and farms of California, we urge President Obama to consider the needs of our state as a whole when voting on this critical bill. Purely a matter of smart policy, it's imperative that we capitalize on water when it is available instead of senselessly sending viable water supplies out to the sea."

State Announces 20 Percent Initial State Water Project Allocation

In late November, the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) announced an initial allocation of 20 percent for water agencies who receive water from the State Water Project, which serves 26 million Californians and supplies about 30 percent of Southern California's water (breakdown available here). This allocation is the first estimate for 2017, and could increase depending on the amount of rain and snowfall captured during the winter and

spring. Due to recent early-season storms, this year's initial allocation is double that of 2016 at 10 percent of deliveries, but still a fraction of water agencies' full contract amounts.

With state officials still warning of a potential sixth year of drought, the allocation announcement further highlighted California's need for modern state water delivery system. Of the announcement, **SCWC Executive Director Charley Wilson** said:

"The storms we've seen so far this season are encouraging, but are not a panacea for the five years of drought California has suffered, and future dry years still loom just around the corner.

The pattern of low water deliveries underscores California's need for a modern water system that would allow us to capture water when it's available, then store until needed during dry years. Our current system permits large amounts of water to be lost out to the ocean, leaving homes, businesses and farms throughout the state high and dry. California WaterFix would protect against earthquakes, prepare for drought and ensure a reliable, efficient statewide water supply."

# State Plan Seeks To Make Water Conservation A Way of Life

Working to make water conservation a way of life, state agencies recently released a <u>draft plan</u> for achieving long-term, efficient water use and meeting drought preparedness goals that reflect California's diverse climate, landscape and demographic conditions. SCWC consistently advocates for Californians to continue the good work they've done thus far to conserve on a day-to-day basis, and supports the encouragement of a "conservation as a California way of life" mentality.

The State Water Resources Control Board has awarded the Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) \$10 million in grant funding for a stormwater facilities improvement project via the Proposition 1 Storm Water Grant Program.

A joint effort between IEUA and Chino Basin Watermaster, these basin improvement projects will allow IEUA to capture, recharge and convey approximately 3,166 acre feet per year of storm water and 2,905 acre feet per year of recycled water.

According to **IEUA Board Member and Watermaster Board Chairman Steven J. Elie**, "The multi-benefit storm water project will contribute to sustained, long-term water benefits for the entire region, and represents remarkable cooperation among all the cities and water districts in the region, who have committed to match the grant for the project."
