**Southern California Water Committee Responds to Oroville Dam Evacuation Lift**

**Los Angeles, CA** - After a mandatory evacuation, due to concern Oroville Dam's damaged emergency spillway might fail, the nearly 200,000 residents living downstream of the dam have been allowed to return home as the mandatory ban was lifted in favor of an evacuation warning and direction to stay vigilant. The Department of Water Resources (DWR) continues to reinforce the emergency spillway with material and regulate outflow as additional storms are expected to occur over the following days. As such, the level of the reservoir continues to decrease, and at current rates is projected to possess the capacity to absorb anticipated inflows due to the forecasted inclement weather.

*"First and foremost, it's important to acknowledge the relief and gratitude in the fact that public health and human safety remained top priority during the situation at the Oroville Dam, with no injuries being reported. With that being said, it's evident from this example alone that the bill has come due for California in the area of water infrastructure.*
